What is an ORCID iD?

- ORCID = global not-for-profit organization run by and for the research community
- ORCID iD = a free, unique, digital persistent identifier (DPI) for researchers

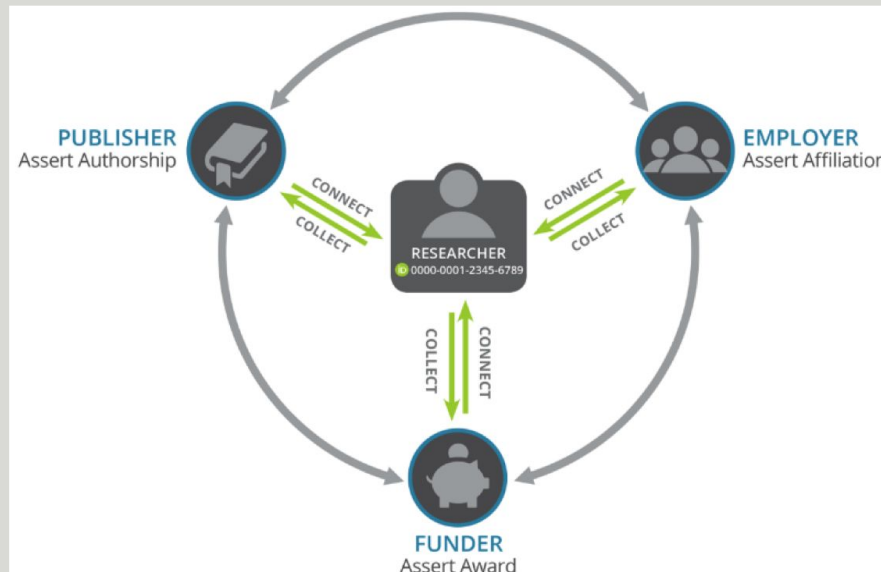

What are some benefits of an ORCID iD for you?

- Eliminates problems with name similarities, variant spellings of names in non-Roman alphabets, name changes, etc.
- Allows researchers to populate their record like a CV
- Saves time: Enter once, reuse often (e.g., grant applications)
- Stays with you throughout your career
- Interoperability with major research databases

Why are we talking about ORCID now?

- Emory must comply with [National Security Presidential Memo 33](#) (NSPM-33), which **directs researchers receiving federal funds to use a digital persistent identifier (DPI) starting in 2023.** ([implementation guidance](#)).
- ORCID is the only DPI that meets all NSPM-33 requirements.
- 100+ publishers require authors to have an ORCID iD.

What do you need to do?

It's simple!

1. Don't have an ORCID iD? Register for one and connect it to Emory at <https://orcid.emory.edu/>.
2. Already have an ORCID iD? Connect it to Emory at <https://orcid.emory.edu/> .
3. Populate your record with ORCID's automated tools.

Reminder: New NIH Data-Sharing Requirements for 2023

- Effective date: Jan. 25, 2023
- New policy requires investigators and institutions to:
 - Plan and budget for the managing and sharing of data
 - Submit a data management and sharing (DMS) plan for review when applying for funding
 - Comply with the approved DMS plan
